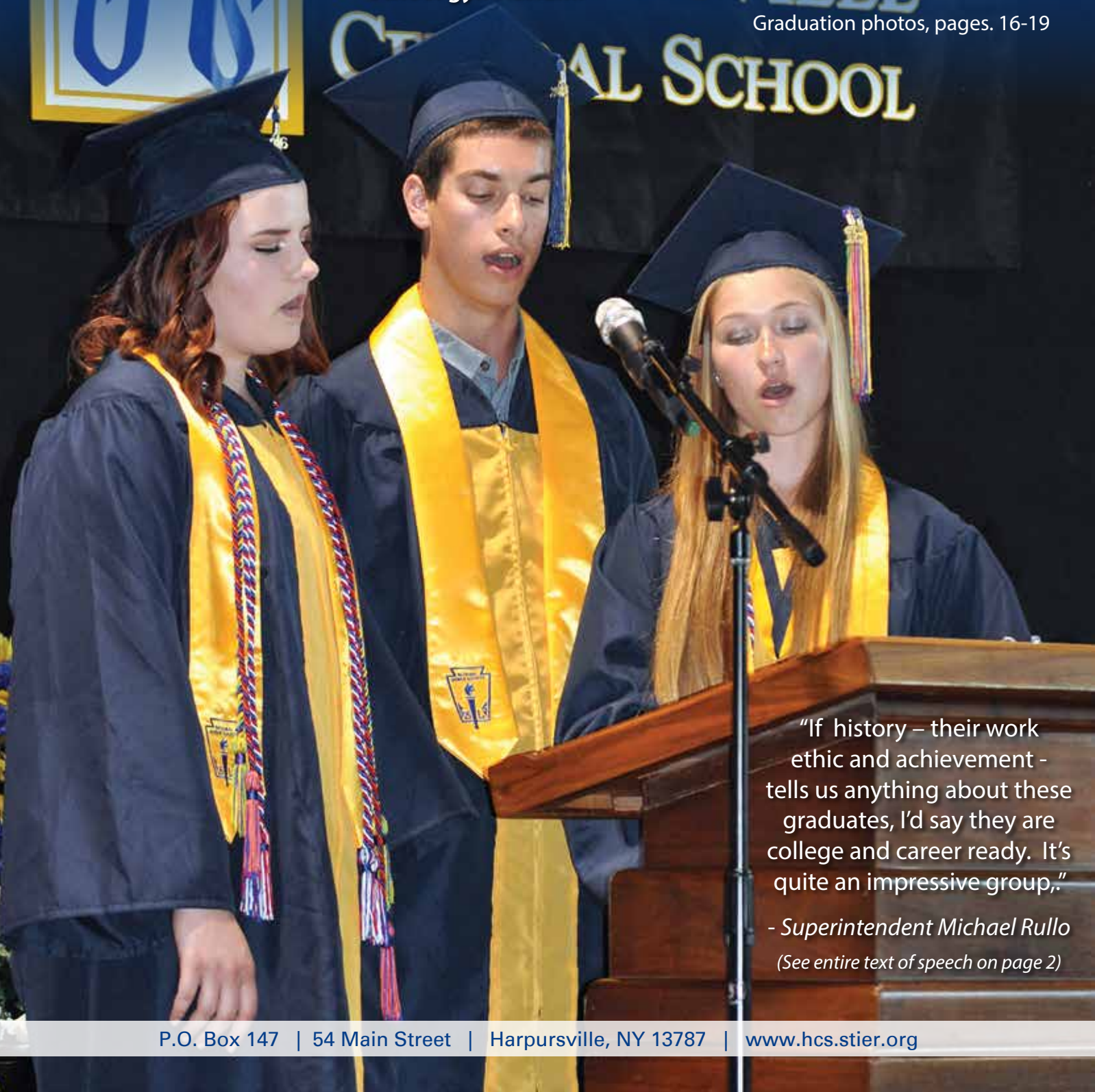


Ready for the future

Superintendent Michael Rullo's address to the graduating Class of 2016

This class is a really, really impressive group. Let me give you a few statistics about our graduates and I think you'll agree with me:

There are 60 graduates in this class, most of whom are here today. This class has earned the following:

- 2 Career Development and Occupational Studies credentials
- 3 local diplomas
- 2 local diplomas with a Career and Technical Education Endorsement
- 23 Regents diplomas
- 3 Regents diplomas with honors
- 15 Regents diplomas with a Career and Technical Education Endorsement – an important statistic and you'll hear in a moment how many students are job-ready as a result of the CTE education and credentials
- 7 Advanced Designation Regents diplomas
- 1 Advanced Regents with honors
- 1 Advanced Regents with mastery in math
- 2 Advanced Regents diplomas with honors and mastery in math AND science
- 1 Advanced Regents diploma with honors and a Career and Technical Education Endorsement

And there's more good news ...

So many of our students are not only graduating, they are also leaving us job-ready as a result of their two years of study at BOCES.

- 22 students successfully completed a two-year BOCES trade program
- 18 students earned a Career & Technical Education endorsement on their diploma ... earned via successful completion of their program and passing the rigorous NOCTI exams.

Let me highlight just how invaluable these experiences are through one example. One of our graduates completed a work-study program through much of his senior year where he took his BOCES training and went to a job site to perform. This resulted in not only a job during his senior year, but also a job after graduation doing exactly what he loves and what he has trained to do. Allyn Rhodes, please stand up and be recognized - great job!

And our students planning to go to college are well-prepared for that too:

- 44 of the graduates (that's over 70%) successfully completed at least one college credit. These students earned a total of 709 college credits.
- 17 students have more than one full-time semester of college or over 15 credits under their belt. 8 students are graduating with over 30 college credits! This means they already have sophomore standing in college. But there's more...6 students have more than 40 credits, 3 have 50 or more, and...are you ready for this...1 student has more than 60 credits. This leads me to a Harpursville Central Schools first that deserves recognition. For the first time ever, we had a student earn his Associates Degree from TC3 before he even graduated from high school. Ben Copeland, stand up, and be recognized.

When you consider these diploma statistics and college credits, keep

in mind that these students did all of this while completing other rigorous high school courses, participating in all types of extra-curricular activities such as sports and clubs, and while having jobs. Are these students ready for whatever is next? If history – their work ethic and achievement - tells us anything about these graduates, I'd say they are college and career ready. It's quite an impressive group, don't you think?



Student Council get-out-and-vote campaign provides lesson in democracy

In May, the Harpursville Student Council ran its inaugural #VilleVotes campaign to help students learn about the democratic process through active participation. The campaign kicked off with the help of Norene Tasber and Chef Dan, who met with the Student Council to organize a senior high online vote on our Moving Up Day luncheon. More

than 400 votes were cast, resulting in a winning menu of chicken spiedies, macaroni salad, and watermelon.

Continuing with #VilleVotes, the teachers voted to elect the 2016-2017 flag bearer and flag defender. For next year, Dale Youngs and Ashlee Howell will hold these prestigious positions,

giving the daily announcements and reciting the "Pledge of Allegiance."

Additionally, throughout May more than 60 students in grades six through 11 completed the required paperwork to run for class officer and/or student council. On May 31 and June 1, Harpursville students voted to fill these positions.

Young photographers offer community perspective with ‘Through Our Eyes’ project

Tenth-graders Manuella DiLuzio and Brock McWherter were among a group of students in the Southern Tier Pathways in Technology Early College High School (P-TECH) program who recently provided a unique perspective on the strengths and needs of our community as part of an initiative called the “Through Our Eyes” photography project.

The brainchild of state Assemblywoman

Donna Lupardo, the project challenged students to share their personal views of our community through a series of photographs. Their work - featuring scenes of hope, despair and pride - was recently on display at Binghamton’s First Friday at Enviren Calibrations, 202 State Street.

Students took more than 4,000 photographs during a series of outings throughout the Triple Cities. They then scrutinized each for quality, composition and message, winnowing the collection to 27 images to exhibit that best illustrate the key themes.

“It gives us an opportunity to see things from a new perspective,” Lupardo said of the student exhibit. “And it also gives those of us in policy positions perhaps some ideas on things that need further improvement. And there are certainly things that need improvement in our

P-TECH is a six-year, state grant-funded program that enables students to earn both a high school diploma and associate’s degree, the latter being at no cost. Students also work with several community partners to develop professional skills. The grant was awarded to the Binghamton City School District in partnership with Broome-Tioga BOCES, 11 area school districts, SUNY Broome Community College, and business partners such as Lockheed Martin, Delta Engineers, Bothar Construction and Lourdes Hospital.

A moving bit of history

According to social studies teacher Kim Rusnak's extensive research, Moving Up Day evolved out of a Harpursville tradition in the late 1930's called "Class Night," which was held the night before graduation.



The first official Moving Up Day was conducted in the early 1950's to recognize the end of a school year and the "moving on" to the next grade (or in the case of seniors, to adulthood). Over the next few decades, traditions such as creating a class motto, picking a class flower, wearing class colors and ribbons, hanging up streamers in the hallways,

singing songs, grade-level competitions, basketball tournaments, movies in the auditorium, talent shows, and other events were added. All of this culminated with the classes moving to their new spot in the auditorium. This year, we continued the tradition by keeping many of our time-honored traditions while adding a few new ones.



While the senior high enjoyed a schedule full of Moving Up Day events, junior high students were enjoying their own fun-filled day. Continuing a tradition that started last year, the 7th grade went to the Most Museum of Science and Technology while the 8th grade went to Wonderworks in Syracuse. Student musicians celebrate year's end with a piano recital

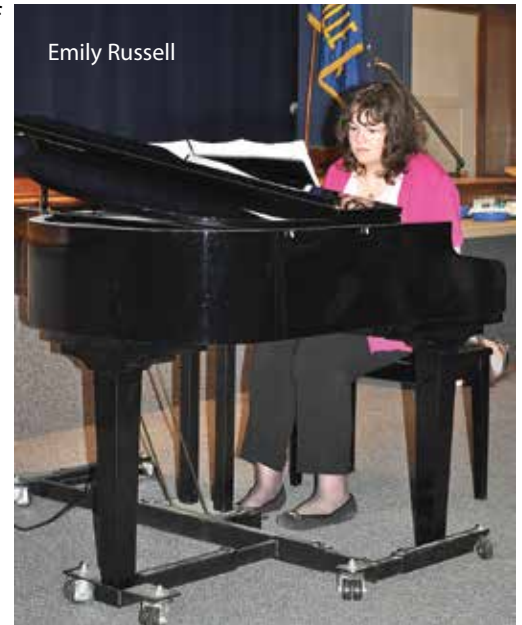

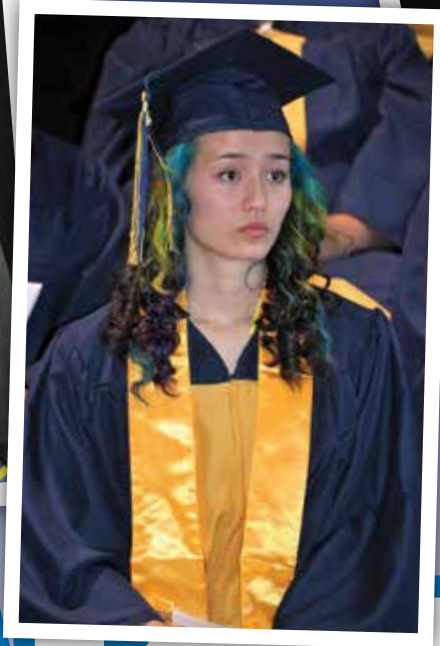

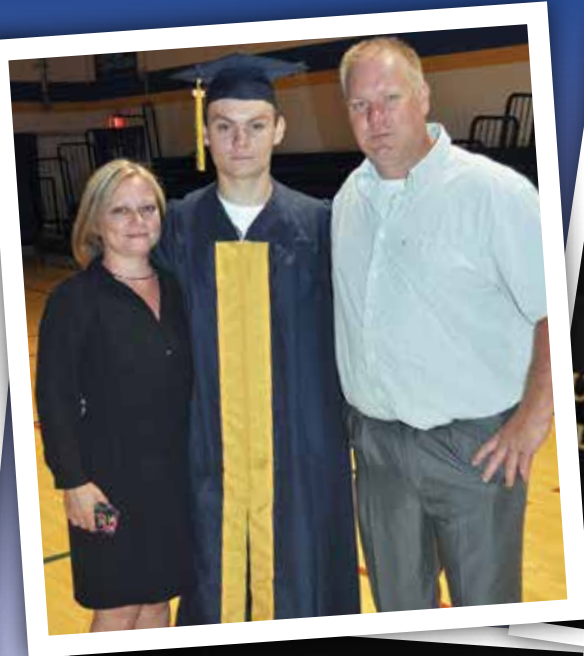
