Marble roll provides fun, challenge


Julie Feheley's ninth-grade Design and Drafting for Production class recently spent a couple of weeks playing with marbles... with a strategic lesson in mind, of course.

Once the design work was complete, the team, with help from technology teacher Bruce Salisbury, facilitated the silk-screen printing just in time for the race.








