A message from the Superintendent

Dear Residents,

I hope this letter finds you well and looking forward to springtime. This is always an exciting, albeit busy, time of the school year and this year is no different. As such, I'd like to take a few moments to provide some congratulatory and celebratory information, outline some necessary school calendar changes as a result of the most recent winter storm, and remind you of the remaining schedule for our budget development process.

First and foremost, we continue to have many wonderful

things happen in our schools as a direct result of the hard work and cooperation of our students, parents and staff. Of particular note is the recent success of our Odyssey of the Mind teams who competed against their regional peers on March 18 at Broome-Tioga BOCES. Our district sent four teams to the tournament and they brought home two trophies. We are so proud of the students for their effort and achievement with Odyssey. Furthermore, for the second consecutive year, our district will have a team representing the W.A. Olmsted Elementary at the state tournament. This can happen only because of the dedication, teamwork and ingenuity of the students who participate in Odyssey, the parents who provide so much support in preparation

for the tournament and on competition day, and the staff members who coach our teams. This is an outstanding example of the bright and hard-working students who fill our classrooms every day. We wish all the best to our team at the "states" and to all of our students as the school year moves toward its conclusion.

Switching gears entirely, I'd like to take a brief moment to remind everyone that the district has had to amend the school calendar due to the unprecedented number of emergency closing days that we had to use this winter. Several weeks ago, the school community was informed that Friday, May 26, would be a day of instruction for students. Now, we must also include Friday, April 21, as a day of instruction, too. The addition of these two days as days of instruction ensure that the district is meeting its requirement for the minimum days of attendance by students and, more importantly, provides for valuable

time needed for our students to receive the instruction and learning opportunities necessary for success in their courses. A letter indicating these calendar changes has been sent home to parents/guardians and has been posted on the district's website for your review as well.

The American Heart Association has impacted many lives thanks to all the efforts of these "Heart Heroes." Funds have gone to scientists who have won Nobel prizes for their work. Some 30 million children are eating healthier school meals because of the heart association's work with the USDA, and 27 states now require CPR education in schools. The American Heart Association has worked with health care providers to reduce the number of people dying from heart disease and stroke by 25 percent.




Today's breakfast menu is brought to you by ... W. A. Olmsted Elementary

How does matter react chemically?

The fifth-graders have been spending quite a bit of time learning about physical and chemical changes.

They've learned that physical changes do not make a new substance but the form of the substance may change. However, with a chemical change, a new substance is created. We've learned through many stations and labs that in order for us to tell if a new substance has actually been formed, meaning a chemical change has occurred, we must look for the four main clues: drastic color change (ex: white to black), bubbles (gas is created), light production and heat production. The students recently completed a lab where they had to identify an unknown substance based on the physical and chemical observations for the four known substances.

In the photo to the right, Connor Leach shows that a chemical reaction has occurred when he added iodine to cornstarch. The drastic color change occurred when the color went from white powder and a brown liquid to a new substance that was a dark purple or black color.
