Assistance program will tap into peer potential in the classroom

A new program aimed at improving academic success will provide intense tutoring assistance to struggling students.

The Teacher Assistance Program (TAP) matches students who need help with academic subjects or technical skills with peer tutors proficient in those areas. Emphasis is placed on ensuring students are given the opportunity to receive one-on-one or group-on-one support to achieve success in school. The program is anchored in the principle that a place of learning is a community, and that it is the responsibility of all community members to contribute to the success and the quality of the learning environment.

Peer assistants will be selected based on their academic strengths and the recommendations of their teachers. Tutors will be required to attend a training session with Kelly Rooney, family and consumer science teacher. The training will detail specific information about the needs in the classroom.

Peers are a readily available, but frequently untapped resource in the classroom. The involvement of peers needs to be ongoing. Open communication, valuing of diversity, fostering respect, fostering proximity, modeling and establishing behavioral expectations all contribute to positive peer interactions.



Student earns first place in SkillsUSA regional competition, is states bound

Harpursville senior Ryan Grose proved himself to be among the best in his chosen field, returning home February 26 with a first place trophy from the SkillsUSA Area II regional competition at SUNY Morrisville.

Competing in the "Internetworking" category at the regional event, Grose's top placement earned him a trip to the state competition April 27-29 in Syracuse.

Grose, enrolled in Broome-Tioga BOCES' Network Systems Analyst program, was among roughly 850 students from 17 districts across the region who attended the regional event. The BOCES team included 75 students who competed in 38 different contests. Additionally, all 75 participated in the SkillsUSA Statesman Award, which recognizes those who demonstrate leadership skills and have mastered certain requirements in leadership training.

training programs in technical, skilled, and service occupations, including health occupations. 
