Letter from the superintendent



Dear residents.

I hope you had a wonderful Thanksgiving holiday and that you're looking forward to the winter holidays.

This is always an exciting, albeit busy, time of the year as we bounce from one holiday to another. As we get ready to begin a new calendar year, we are inching ever-closer to the middle of our school year. I can tell you that we continue to work hard with and for our students here at the school and there is quite a bit of great stuff happening.

It seems fitting to highlight some fantastic news that I received just before the Thanksgiving holiday that will surely provide a tremendous benefit to our district: Our grant application to the Klee Foundation from early October was accepted and approved! This very generous grant from the Klee Foundation will provide funding to support a community schools coordinator position that will enable our school district to become part of the Binghamton University Promise Zone. Our proposal was quite significant: Three years of financial support to fully fund the cost of the coordinator, plus some funding to support community outreach and family engagement. This grant, coupled with the Promise Zone, will bring more than \$280,000 worth of resources to our district over the next few years in addition to bringing the resources of Binghamton University directly into our district. I am truly humbled by the generosity of the Klee Foundation, but I am also excited to see the benefits of the program for our students and their families. We are hoping to get this model up and running for the second half of the school year.

In thinking a little more about the holiday season, please be reminded of our winter concert. This is always an enjoyable event and a nice time for our students to showcase their musical talents. The concert is scheduled for Monday, December 18, at 7 p.m. in the Jr. Sr. High School auditorium. We'll have our vocal groups featuring grades 5-12 and our instrumental groups featuring grades 6-12. I look forward to seeing our students and families at the concert.

We wrapped up our fall sports season last month and quickly transitioned to get our winter sports off and running. We constantly strive to ensure that our student-athletes are successful both in the classroom and in their contests. You'll be pleased to know that the following teams earned scholar-athlete awards this past fall: football, golf, volleyball, field hockey, girls' cross country and soccer. This means that at least 75 percent of the students on each team had an overall average of 90 percent or higher. That is so impressive! Please join me in congratulating our student-athletes, and if you have the chance with one of the team members, let them know just how important you think it is that they are excelling in the classroom and in their sport.

We've been doing some work to update and refresh our brand as a school district. The Board of Education provided

its approval of our updated mascot and logos at its last meeting. We know that there is a strong sense of school and community pride in being the Harpursville Hornets and we wanted to reinvigorate the school with some new, fresh images that will surely provide a fresh injection of school spirit, strengthen our identity as the Harpursville Hornets, and build a strong brand. In the coming weeks and months, you'll surely see our updated

Switching gears just a little, I know that I am probably going to jinx myself by saying this, but every day that passes without snow and bitter cold gets us one day closer to springtime. If/when winter does arrive, we'll be ready for the snow and cold and the impact that the winter weather might have on our school schedule. Please allow me to remind you of a recent letter that was sent to our school families with information about delays and closings. We've also posted the letter on the district's website for your review. This is particularly important as our district, similar to many of the surrounding districts in the region, has added a new 3-hour delay option.

Looking ahead to January, please mark your calendars for a bus vote scheduled on January 16, 2018, from 1:30 - 8 p.m. in the elementary school. I sincerely appreciate the support that's been shown in the past for ensuring that our bus fleet remains up-to-date and safe for our students. Furthermore, as you may recall, we've worked to develop a sound fleet replacement plan that enables us to leverage our transportation aid ratio of approximately 90 percent while maintaining high trade-in values on the buses being replaced. If you have any questions related to the upcoming bus vote, please be sure to contact me or Joe McLaughlin, school business administrator, in the district office.

In closing, I would like to wish each and every resident a wonderful holiday season with your family and friends. I hope it's a season marked by many, many blessings.

They had to reverse engineer a chair, layout the design and minimize the materials used.


Each chair was cut from just 30 feet of pressuretreated decking with no more than 60 squareinches of scrap. That was the easy part. The students then had to construct their chairs.







The first five weeks of the kindergarten after-school program have flown by. In our time together, we have accomplished a lot. Students have participated in team-building activities, social-skill-building, yoga and movement. During our first block of time together, we focused on building relationships with one another through a variety of activities. Some of those included going outside to use the parachute as a group, building stations with partners, and "ice breakers." For the last hour every day the kindergarten students are engaged in movement activities. Sometimes we play games in the gymnasium while other days we focus on yoga movements and breathing. Each student has progressed and grown throughout the first five weeks of the after-school enrichment program.


