Fast Forward Business Law class

On Tuesday, Dec. 5, the Fast Forward Business Law class had the opportunity to visit the Broome County Courthouse to see our criminal justice system in action. While there, Ms. Judy Osburn, the Chief Clerk, spoke to the students about the procedures of the hearings and trials that were to take place.

Students witnessed a sentencing in one case and a hearing in another, with a sentencing date scheduled for March 2024. After the cases, Judge Cocchiola, the Assistant District Attorney, and the Defense Attorney spent extra time in the courtroom answering questions about the cases.

Students are looking forward to their two upcoming field trips to the Broome County Jail and 911 Center in mid-December and the Elmira Correctional Facility in January 2024.





A visit to the North Pole

Since the beginning of November, all the high school art classes have been busy working on a collaborative immersive art experience. The goals of the project are to design a work that will be an active experience for the viewers; to develop the students' ability to work as artists within a community of artists; and to have an artwork that will bring the broader community together. This project was developed following the recent tragic loss of Harpursville senior Makai Wilkinson. Through the students' processing of their grief, a vital concept emerged: art could help people come together and feel comforted by community. The theme of re-creating what a visit to the North Pole may feel like through the eyes of a child was decided upon.

Each student was able to contribute to the entire project by playing to their strengths, choosing segments to work on of interest and ability, and maintaining an overall shared group vision for the finished product. This process reflects the real-life work experience of being a part of a design team. Because the project started with group brainstorming and collecting ideas that met the theme, every student was able to contribute their own voice of what is special about the holiday season for them. Students got eager to work once we decided on the key components. The Studio Art and Drawing and Painting classes would handle the details for the project, like making wreaths and portraits of Mr. and Mrs. Claus, sewing elf hats and ears, painting a winter scene on the doors, and developing an impressive entrance way for "Santa's" house. The photography class would develop elf portraits, using one another as models, stop-motion animations with a holiday theme, and address the technology components. The sculpture class would take care of the tree, which proved to be particularly challenging using cardboard! Luckily, we were able to receive a generous donation from nearby High Meadow Tree Farm of a live tree as well!

The project will culminate with the high school students dressing as Santa, Mrs. Claus, and elf helpers while the elementary classes come and hear a story and have a treat. The Foods class, with Judith Salton, will be baking the cookies that the students will be decorating and enjoying with their cup of cocoa before heading back to the elementary building. The visits will take place in the last week of school before the break.


VOICES IN THE AUDITORIUM



An 1840s Makerspace for 21st Century Students

The U.S. History and Government students took a trip "back in time" to 1840s Upstate NY when they visited the Cooperstown Farmers' Museum on Nov. 14. Once there, they each took part in a workshop of their choice, including the offerings of Life on the Farm, blacksmithing, pharmacy, textiles, and reverse glass painting. Students were all able to engage in hands-on activities to produce items ranging from fritters to lip balm to hooks. After lunch in the barn, students were then taken on a tour that covered an overview of small town and rural life from the 1840s and were then treated to a carousel ride on carved wooden animals indigenous to New York State.
