



SAT School Day

The SAT is one of two widely-recognized college entrance exams. We will be administering the SAT here at school on Wednesday, March 23. While not all colleges require SAT or ACT scores, and in fact many remain "test-optional" following COVID, the recommendation is generally for any college-bound student to take the SAT during the spring of their junior year in the event that a college they apply to requires a score or so that a strong score can be used to strengthen the application even if not required by the college.

School board seat soon vacated

One seat on the Harpursville Central School District Board of Education will soon be vacated due to the resignation of Michael Bennett, effective March 24, 2022. Should the board choose to fill this vacancy, it would be filled for the period March 25 through May 17, 2022. The board has accepted letters of interest from residents who would like to become a school board member and will review them at the March 9, 2022, board meeting. They will decide at that time whether to fill the seat for the two months.

School board seats up for election on May 17, 2022

Two seats on the Harpursville Central School District Board of Education will be up for election on May 17, 2022: A five-year term beginning July 1, 2022, and ending June 30, 2027, the seat currently occupied by Kacie Huston; and an unexpired, two-year term beginning on July 1, 2022, and ending on June 30, 2024, the seat currently occupied by Michael Bennett.

Election Information

The school budget vote and board member elections are conducted annually on the third Tuesday in May. This year,

Young artists face off in classroom version of 'Art Chopped" By Brenda Keeler, art teacher

The start of the semester for the 7th grade began with an art challenge that was an adapted version of the Food Network show, "Chopped.," a longrunning show in which contestants are given "mystery ingredients" that they must make into a dish within a set amount of time. Their efforts are then put before a small panel of expert chef judges.

In art class, the students were given a paper bag of "mystery ingredients" that they had to make a themed sculpture within a 20-minute time period. They had to use all the materials and were further challenged by having to work as a collaborative team that was randomly selected. The artwork and the teamwork were of equal importance.

The judges were initially current art teacher Brenda Keeler and a guest judge, recently retired art teacher Ann McDonald. The judging criteria included four key areas: artisanship, content, cooperation and collaboration. The

artist groups had to make a sculpture that included everyone's ideas, was put together well, met the content theme, and was truly a group effort.

The challenge began with four student groups and went on for three rounds. When the first group of students was "chopped" by Ms. Keeler and Mrs. McDonald, they were then able to act as judges for the remaining three teams. The last round had as many student judges as artists. All of the student judges took their roles seriously, continuing to develop their cooperative and collaborative skills. The artist groups also continued to hone the same skill set, becoming stronger contenders Inspired by the Food Network show, teams of students use bags of "mystery ingredients" to create art and compete trying not to get "chopped".

Creating art from sustainable materials - handmade paper, natural paints

The Creative Crafts class has been working on a sustainable art project throughout the fall and spring semesters. They had a visit from a quest artist in the fall that helped to inspire a project to create handmade paper and natural paints. For paper, the shredded paper from the main office at school was put into a blender with water, thoroughly blended and then formed into sheets with a deckle and mold. Next, it was time to experiment with paint making. Paints were made mostly from herbs and spices as well as soy sauce, blueberries and seaweed.
