Real World Science - Minecraft - sustainable community project - by Mark Muller



The Harpursville Real World Science class is working on a sustainable community project. The objectives of this project are to:

- Increase each students' awareness when it comes to the United Nations' sustainable development goals (SDGs) for 2030.
- Enable students to build a better future in Minecraft Education Edition by adding their SDGs solution to the UN project.

• Students will present their solutions in a local small setting or globally online and promote the publishing and sharing of important work.

Guiding ideas

Can students increase their awareness of the sustainable development goals through exploration of the issues, previous student builds and video media?

Can students plan and build a targeted solution for a given or chosen sustainable development goal in Minecraft Education Edition?

Can students answer deeper questions while working on and after completing their SDG solution?

Student activities

Students learn about the SDGs through website research and video media provided by the Real World teacher in this class. They add their own solution for a given or chosen goal, and present their solution and answer deeper questioning about the process and product. We will publish the products in a later issue.



Students explore concepts of sustainability in art - by Brenda Keeler

The Creative Crafts class has been exploring the concept of sustainability. Their study began with an ephemeral art project based on the work of Earth artist Andy Goldsworthy. Goldsworthy designs temporary nature installations using on-site materials. The works are left out in nature, where the elements can interact with the design.

Students were shown examples of Goldsworthy's work, especially those inspired by fall foliage, then challenged to work in small groups to develop a collaborative idea for a nature installation. The site for these works was along the wooded trail on the school grounds. Students spent a few days making art in nature while enjoying the fall weather. There were several approaches to the project, with one group discovering that paint could be made from wild berries!

The next phase of the study was a visit by a local folk artist sponsored by Local Learning (locallearningnetwork.org). Local Learning is a national network that connects folklorists, artists, and educators and advocates for the full inclusion of folklife and folk arts in education to transform learning, build intercultural understanding, and create stronger communities. The guest artist, Shailesh Upreti, and art teacher Brenda Keeler participated in a





Local Learning workshop this

past summer entitled "Culture, Community and the Classroom." The two were paired to implement a project together in the Fall of 2021 that would bring the folk arts into the school environment.

Shailesh Upreti is a folk musician and dancer who came to speak to the students about the interconnectedness of nature, music and dance. He is also a green technologies entrepreneur, currently developing North America's largest home grown Gigafactory for lithium-ion batteries in a reclaimed IBM factory in nearby Endicott. As he explained, *"Folk music keeps me connected and full of positive energy even while I am surrounded by noise, pollution or (the) highly busy society we live in today."*

Throughout his visit he discussed the importance of sustainability principles within broader society and as a gift for future generations. He shared how his love and respect for our planet is at the core of his life as a folk musician and entrepreneur.

The next part of the sustainability project is how

students implement the lessons from Upreti's visit and extend the Goldsworthy art installation. The concept of making their own natural art materials, specifically paints and paper, became the next focus. During this phase, the district switched to remote learning. Students were able to make their own paints from materials found around the home, such as spices, coffee and soil. Our budding earth artists shared their explorations via Zoom. There was even discussion about finding binding agents, such as heavy cream, to develop a natural paint that would mimic the consistency of a commercially produced material. Upreti was able to attend a Zoom meeting and follow-up with the progress for the in-progress project. Students will continue to work with sustainable material development in Creative Crafts.

All of the findings from this study were shared at a Local Learning showcase at The Roberson Museum in Binghamton on November 20, 2021. 2021 NY Showcase - Local Learning (locallearningnetwork.org)
