

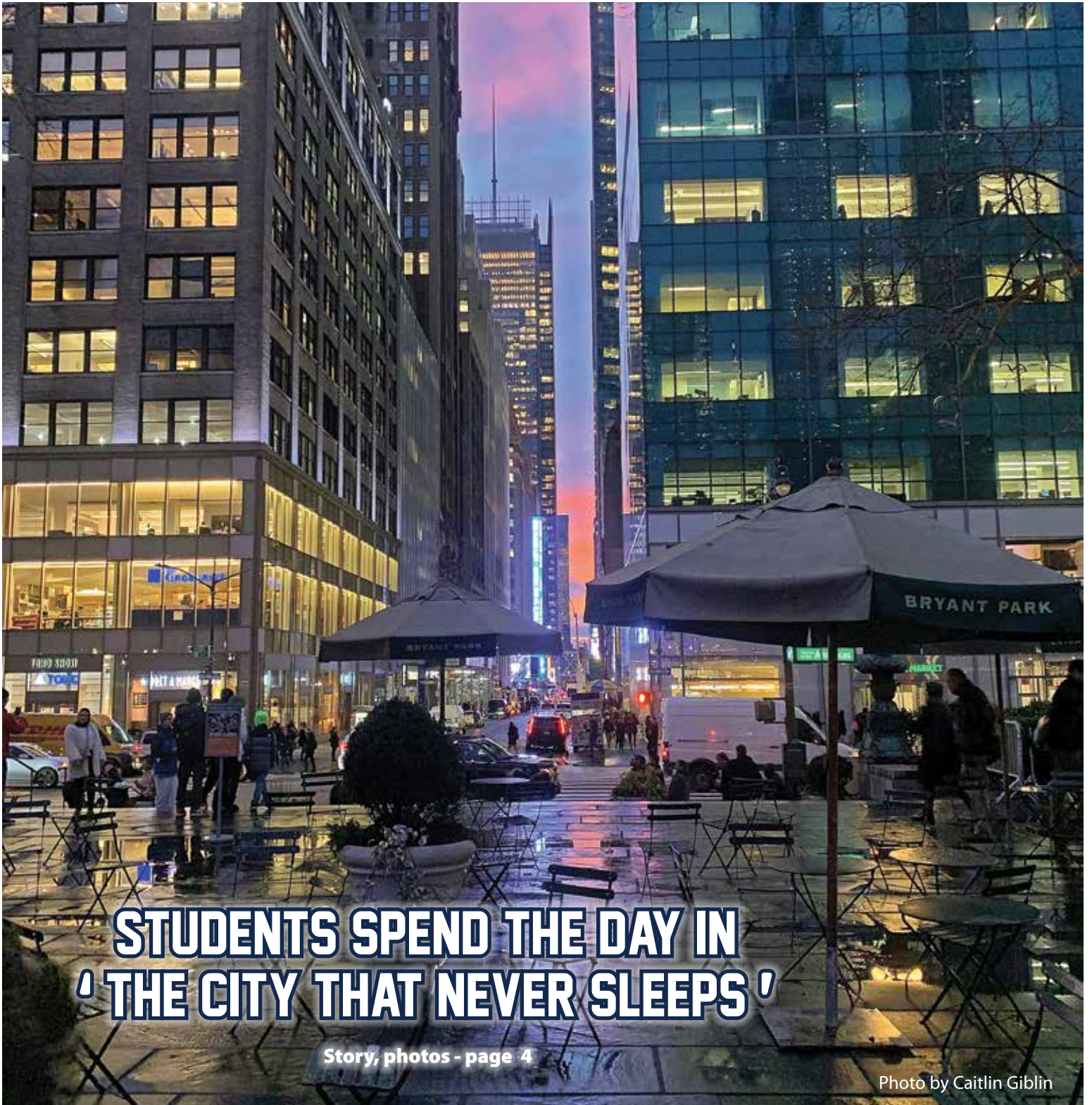

I wish to take a moment to draw your attention to the upcoming 2020 U.S.

Census process that will be starting April 1, 2020. You might be asking, "Why is Mr. Rullo talking about the census in the school's newsletter?" The New York State School Boards Association provides an excellent answer to this question in its February 3, 2020, edition of On Board, in which the author, Paul Heiser, writes, "The census has significant implications for public schools. The data help determine how billions of federal education dollars are distributed, since funding formulas rely heavily on population and poverty levels." Thus, we must ensure that our district's data is as accurate as possible so that we receive the funding that we are entitled to. Heiser goes on to write that allocations of federal dollars impacts things in our community like: Title funding for schools (a significant impact to the Harpursville Schools), the National School Lunch Program, the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children (WIC), Medicaid and the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP). Unrelated to direct funding, be reminded that an accurate census count also has an impact on the congressional representation our state will have in the U.S. House of Representatives, thereby helping to support increased influence in a manner consistent with the needs and values of our local communities. So, please be sure to participate in the census process and to make sure that your friends and extended family members do so as well. The next 10 years depends on it. [Continued, next page](#)

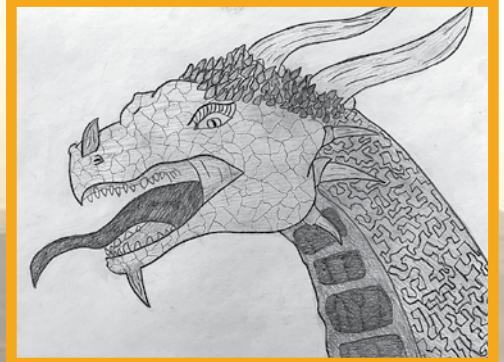

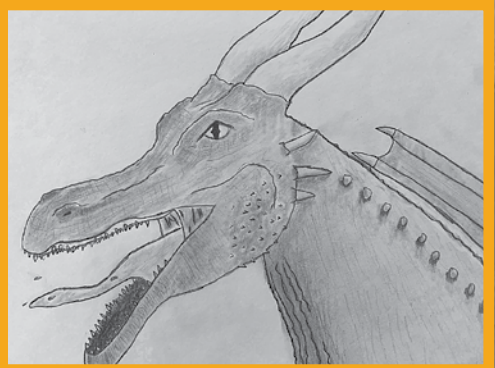

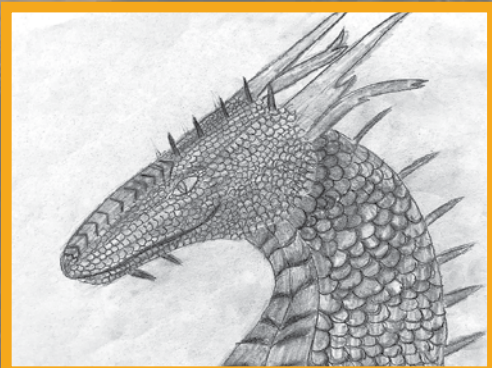

To run for school board in New York state, you must be:

- A U.S. citizen
- At least 18 years old
- A qualified voter in the school district
- Able to read and write
- A resident of your district continuously for one year before the election.

W.A. Olmsted students are currently preparing for the upcoming grades 3 – 6 NYS ELA tests. The ELA test will be given on Wednesday, March 25, through Friday, March 27. ## Before the test

- If your child has struggled with a particular area or subject in the past, you may be able to help them overcome some of that difficulty by providing some extra practice.
- Assisting your child with homework and ensuring that your child is completing all homework assignments.
- Helping students to develop good study habits, thinking skills, and a positive attitude toward school, and encouraging them to do their best while testing.

- Helping your child learn how to follow directions carefully.
- Ensuring that your child has good attendance at school.

## On test day

- Making sure your child gets a good night’s sleep and eats a healthy breakfast.
- Staying calm and being positive about the test will help your child stay calm.

Students have worked really hard on how to work together and what that sounds like and looks like. In doing so, they soon realized that if they use their partners strengths they accomplish way more than working alone.

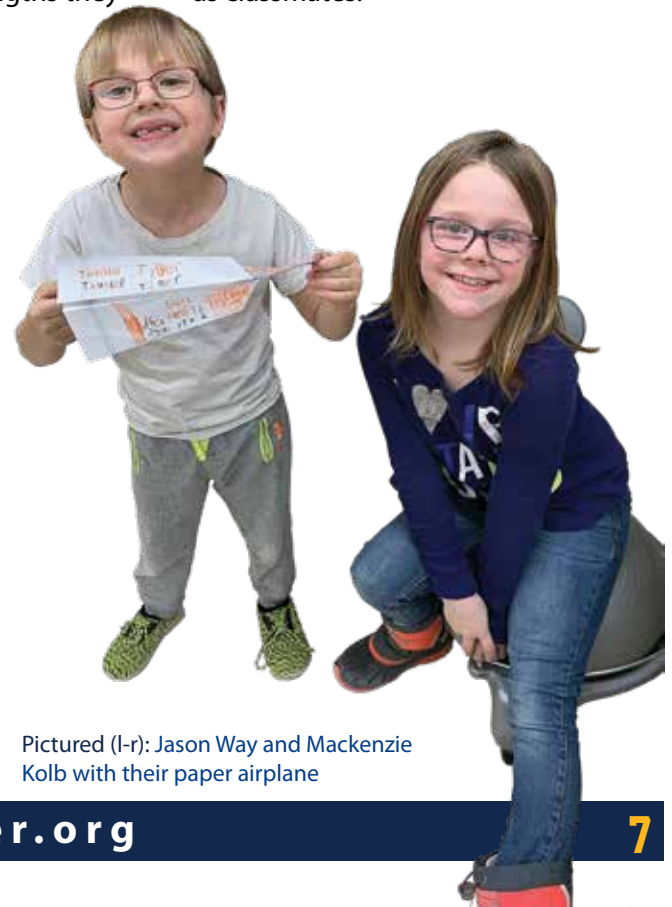
Some of the challenges

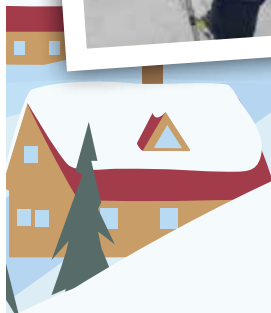
## Another great year for ski club as membership grows, skills improve

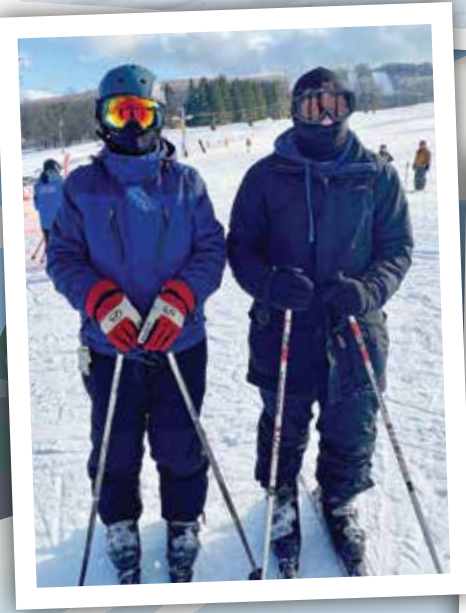

thanks to the district, our chaperones and to our amazing bus drivers who transported us safely each week.

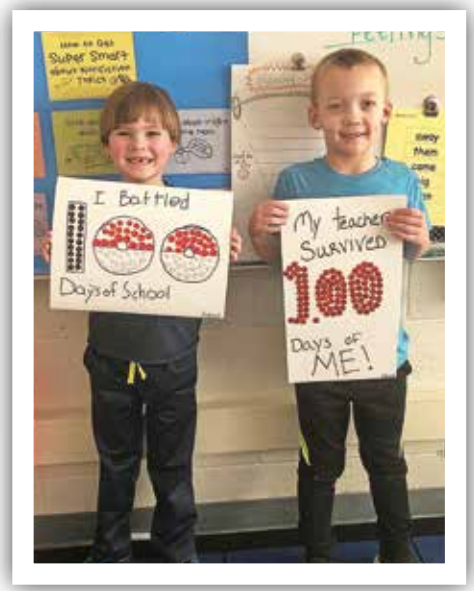
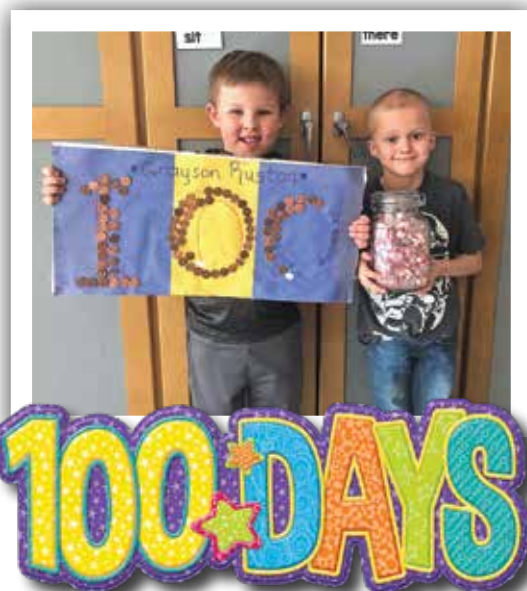

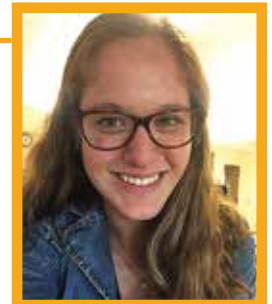
