Helpful, healthful reminders from the health office

Tick season is upon us... Keep your family safe against the threat of Lyme disease and other tick-borne illnesses by making sure you check yourselves for ticks after playing outside. Pets can bring them inside as well, so be sure to treat and check your furry family members too! When going on hikes or in wooded areas,



wear clothing that covers your limbs, such as jeans, long sleeve shirts, hats and long socks to decrease the likelihood of getting bit by a tick. If you do find a tick, remove it, carefully. Be sure to grasp the tick at the head so that the head does not stay attached to your skin. Monitor the site for several days and keep an eye out for any rashes that may develop. If you experience a rash, fever, headache, dizziness, fatigue, joint/body aches and pains, night sweats, vision changes- call your health care provider right away. These are just some of the possible signs and symptoms of Lyme disease.

Sun protection.... Protecting yourself and your family from the sun damage is important. Remember to wear sunglasses and apply sunscreen (20-30 minutes prior to going out) while outside. This is also important during cloudy days, as the sun's harmful UV rays are still a threat. If possible, wear long sleeve shirts and long pants to help protect your skin. Hats can also serve as protection from the sun.



Allergies vs. colds vs. Covid... Is it your typical seasonal allergies? Have you caught a Spring cold? Maybe you




are coming down with Corona Virus? It certainly can be hard, if not impossible to tell. Unfortunately, this is why schools are required to ask for a negative COVID test result, or a lab-proven alternate diagnosis (such as the flu or strep) from a healthcare provider for

students to return to school after having symptoms such as: runny nose, sore throat, headache, fatigue, shortness of breath, gastrointestinal upset, fever, or cough. Although this may seem excessive, it is to ensure that we prevent the spread of the COVID virus, and to keep our students, staff, and families safe. Sadly, this virus is hard to detect based solely on symptoms alone because while one infected person may just have a runny nose, another may have severe shortness of breath, fevers, and headaches. It affects people so differently, therefore it is important that if a COVID test is recommended by the school and/or your health care provider, that you get tested or quarantine appropriately

as an alternative. We sincerely appreciate the cooperation from our students, staff, and families so far. We are in this together!

Helmet safety.... Let's get the scary facts out of the way... Head injury is the leading cause of death in bicycle crashes and is the most important determinant of bicycle-related death and permanent disability. Nearly half (47%) of children ages 14 and under are hospitalized for bicycle-related head injury. Head injuries account for more than 60% of bicycle related deaths. Children ages 10-14, especially males, have the highest

Harpursville students participate in state mathematics competition

For the first time, three Harpursville Mathletes competed in the 2020 New York State Mathematics League Championship on Saturday, April 17. The competition was held virtually with 430 students from around New York state. Sarah Young, Oliver Rutherford and Ben Williams competed in four rounds of mathematics competition.

Round 1 was a 10-question team event where competitors can collaborate any way they would like to answer the questions in 20 minutes. Students work together to answer the questions without the use of a calculator. Topics cover high school math only.

Round 2 was the Mega Question Round. It consisted of 15 questions on the theme of "mod," which is something that is high school level but not taught in high school. The competitors had to teach themselves the new skill and then apply the new skill to problems, all in 30 minutes.

Round 3 was 10 individual problems timed at 10 minutes for two problems. This was the only time the students could not work collaboratively, and still no calculator.



Finally, round 4 was a relay. The students had three questions to work on but the answer to the first question is used in the second. Not only do they need to get the first question correct, it needs to be finished quickly to have enough time for the second and third questions.

The competition was fierce and the questions were challenging. Everyone worked hard, had positive attitudes and represented Harpursville with pride. We look forward to trying again next year, maybe in person.



Try your hand at a problem:

A cobbler makes shoes at a constant rate, taking exactly 53 minutes to make one shoe. Over one week, she produces exactly 41 shoes. At the end of the week, she replaces one of her machines that was breaking down, and starts the second week with a new machine. She works 10 more minutes over this week than the previous week, but after counting her multiple new shoes, she determines that the new machine must be slower. Given that she still takes a whole number of minutes to make each shoe, compute the number of shoes the cobbler has made over these two weeks.

ANSWER: 59


