





#### Letter from the elementary school principal



Wow, I can't believe it's November already.

Our students have been hard at work in the classroom learning new material and working on differentiated instruction through the use of I-Ready, which is a diagnostic instructional reading and mathematics program for students in grades K through 6. This program is adaptive, so it identifies the student's strengths and weaknesses and targets instruction for each individual student. Our students have also had an enjoyable Fall with various fun events, including the activities of Homecoming Week ending with a pep-rally, Fall Fest, the 6<sup>th</sup> grade Halloween Dance, and the Halloween parade and class parties.

Classrooms have also been celebrating days of perfect attendance with a "Give a Cheer We're All Here" sign posted outside classroom doors. A growing body of research is revealing the prevalence of chronic absence and its critical role in student achievement. Studies show that attendance problems in the early years of elementary school predict absenteeism in later grades, and students with the highest absenteeism typically scored lower on state assessments.

For these reasons, the message regarding the importance of school attendance will continue throughout the year. Although over a 95% percent daily attendance rate at W.A. Olmsted Elementary School seems like a great number, that really means that more than 20 students are absent from school each day, which is equal to one classroom of students missing instruction every day.



#### **Director of instruction**



Dear Harpursville community,

Students have all settled into the routine of school and are just about finished with the first quarter. At the beginning of the school year, students take some standard assessments to show their teachers what they know in a variety of subjects. This information enables teachers to plan instruction that supports the specific needs of each student. This year, we are also using another form of assessment and instruction in K-8 classrooms called *i-Ready*.

i-Ready is an online program for reading and math that will help your child's teacher(s) determine your child's needs, personalize their learning, and monitor progress throughout the school year. i-Ready enables teachers to meet a child exactly where they are and provides data to increase the child's learning gains. i-Ready consists of two parts: diagnostic and instruction.

The i-Ready diagnostic is an adaptive assessment that adjusts its questions to suit your child's needs. Each item a student sees is individualized based on his or her answer to the previous question. For example, a series of correct answers will result in slightly harder questions, while a series of incorrect answers will yield slightly easier questions. i-Ready instruction provides students with lessons based on their individual skill level and needs, so a child can learn at a pace that is just right for them. These lessons are fun and interactive to keep children engaged as they learn.

The diagnostic in math covers these domains:

- Number and operations: In grades K–8, this refers to the mathematics skills often thought of as arithmetic, from reading and writing numbers to adding, subtracting, multiplying and dividing different types of numbers. This includes whole numbers, decimals, fractions, integers and irrational numbers.
- Algebra and algebraic thinking: In grades K–8, this refers to math skills related to seeing number patterns, understanding the meaning of addition, subtraction, multiplication and division, and using symbols to write and solve equations including those used to solve word problems.
- Measurement and data: In grades K–8, this is a wide range of math skills related to collecting, organizing and interpreting numerical information, from telling time or using a ruler to measure the length of an object, to using formulas to find volume or surface area. It also includes understanding tables and graphs and, in later grades, statistics and probability.
- **Geometry:** In grades K–8, this refers to a variety of skills related to analyzing two- and three-dimensional shapes. These include naming and classifying shapes using characteristics such as symmetry, number of sides and angle measures, and, in later grades, using congruence and similarity.

The diagnostic in reading covers these domains:

- **Phonics:** Connecting the sounds they hear in spoken words to the letters they see in written words. For example, a student who can connect sounds to letters knows to read "th" in then as a single sound /th/, rather than the sound /t/ and the sound /h/. Students have to learn many different connections between sounds and spelling patterns. In fact, there are so many connections that learning phonics can feel like learning the rules to understand a hidden code. Once students can make these connections quickly and easily, they can really start to read for meaning.
- High-frequency words: Words that appear most often in what children read. Words such as "the", "and", and "it" are highfrequency words. Because these words appear so often, readers must learn to recognize them automatically. Learning to recognize these words automatically helps students read more quickly and easily, which gives them a better opportunity to understand what they are reading.
- Vocabulary: Words a student knows. The more words a student knows, the easier it is for the student to understand what is being read. Good readers know the meaning of many words. Students grow their vocabularies by hearing and reading new words, talking about words and being taught specific words.
- Comprehension literature: A student's ability to understand various types of writing, made up or fictional. Stories are the literary texts that students read most often, but plays and poems are also examples of literary texts. A student who understands literature might identify the sequence of events in a story, discuss the meaning of a poem, or explain the lines a character speaks in a play.
- Comprehension informational text: The student's ability to understand types of writing that are usually true. Books about science or history are examples of informational text, as are newspaper articles or magazine articles. It is usually organized into sections with headings and might contain charts, diagrams and graphs that are important to understanding. A student who understands informational text might identify the main idea and supporting details, describe the way the writing is organized, or draw information out of a photograph or diagram.

All students in grades K-6 have taken both the math and reading assessment (diagnostic) in i-Ready. The 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> graders will be taking both in the next two weeks. If you have a student in one of those grades you will receive some information from your child's teacher. Please talk with your students about how their i-Ready lessons are going. Soon, parents will be able to log on and see their child's progress. Information will be sent home from your child's teacher when that becomes available.

We are excited about the opportunity i-Ready will provide for both our students and teachers. Please reach out to your child's teacher with any questions you have.
