

Letter from the elementary school principal



Happy new school year to all Harpursville families,

We are off and running to a great start to the 2019-2020 school year at W.A. Olmsted Elementary School.

As a school principal, I am sincerely enthusiastic with the appointment of several new exceptional teachers to our school and the welcoming of a school social worker. As a school we are always keeping not only the academic needs of our students in mind, but the social emotional needs as well.

On a school safety note, please adhere to the following regulations surrounding transportation and parent pickup. These regulations have been established to keep our students as safe as possible. If you have questions please call me at 693-8115.

- 1. A student can be picked up only by a parent/guardian or an approved person. If there is a permanent or temporary change to the regularly scheduled form of transport, a written note from the parent/guardian must be provided to the school prior to or on the day the change is effective. Transportation changes without written notification are by emergency only, and the transportation department will not accommodate changes made after 1:45 p.m.
- 2. After 2:25 p.m., all student pick-ups from school will have to go through the parent pick-up process through the cafeteria.

- 3. Students cannot be dropped at school until 7:30 a.m. There is no supervision until that time.
- 4. Parents are not permitted to walk students to their classroom or leave the window area of the main lobby while in the building for school related business.

A chronically absent student is defined as one who misses 10% of school days or more, meaning 17 or more days per school year. Summer gym time stresses team building, problem solving, sportsmanship

Over the course of the summer enrichment program, students in grades first through third grade took part in a variety of gym games. The focus was team building and sportsmanship. Each session started with a specific activity that promoted working together and solving problems, followed by games to continue building those skills. By the end of each week you could see the progress in each student. We had a fantastic time over the four weeks and continue to look forward to building these skills with deeper understandings of why and how they are important.

Monitoring endangered, invasive fish provides critical environmental data

Harpursville Real World Science students are involved in the FishTracker program, which is a student-oriented citizen science project based at Cornell University and funded by the USDA National Institute of Food and Agriculture.

The program records and maps the presence of several species of fish, both endangered and invasive, in New York State.

Harpursville students play a critical role in monitoring the range of fish species using materials and protocols supplied by the program. Students collect environmental DNA (eDNA) from water samples from nearby lakes, streams or ponds using GPS coordinates to identify each site surveyed.

eDNA samples are then sent to Cornell University for analysis using a process known as quantitative PCR (qPCR). Although individual species are often difficult to detect, current qPCR technology shows great promise for determining the presence of even very low numbers of a wide range of species by monitoring for the presence of specific kinds of eDNA.

We then incorporate the information from the qPCR analysis into a fish species database identifying the presence or absence of any of the species we monitor. We also evaluate the results from the water samples for classroom analysis and discussion.





Students learn the basics of reading and writing through summer program

In the Reading and Writing:
Understanding Genres class, the students of fourth, fifth, and sixth grade learned the components of a variety of genres and created their own original work based on each genre of study.
Students created their own original

stories, interviewed partners to create biographies, practiced using specific detail by writing how-to instructions to create Lego sculptures, and wrote original poetry using imagery to accompany their art projects. Along with learning new writing techniques, the students also learned team-building and









































Homecoming dance a big success
