School board seats up for election in May

Two seats on the Harpursville Central School District Board of Education will be up for election on May 16, 2023:

- A five-year term beginning July 1, 2023, and ending June 30, 2028, for the seat currently occupied by Melissa Anderson; and an unexpired, three-year term

beginning on May 17, 2023, and ending on June 30, 2026, for the seat previously occupied by Jessica Hartman and currently occupied by John Dattoria.

April is Occupational Therapy Month!

What Do OTs Treat?
Below is a list of common problems an occupational therapist treats.

- **Decreased range of motion** - limits in moving the head, neck, body, or limbs
- **Decreased strength** - difficulty performing age-appropriate weight bearing movements (e.g., bear walk, wheelbarrow walk) and holding body positions against gravity (e.g., superman)
- **Fine-motor delays** - difficulty with handwriting and cutting skills, using a pincer grasp to pick up small items, and buttoning a button on a shirt
- **Self-care delays** - difficulty performing dressing, grooming, toothbrushing, and feeding skills
- **Bilateral coordination delays** - difficulty using both hands together to perform a task (e.g., tying shoes, throwing/catching a ball)
- **Visual perceptual disorders** - difficulty organizing visual information from the environment in order to perform a task (e.g., putting a puzzle together)
- **Sensory processing disorders** - difficulty responding appropriately to different sensory experiences (i.e., touch, taste, sound, and movement) which interferes with the ability to perform daily activities

SAT

The SAT is one of two widely-recognized college entrance exams. We will be administering the SAT here at school on Tuesday, April 25 for interested juniors. While not all colleges require SAT or ACT scores, and in fact many remain "test-optional" following COVID, the recommendation is generally for any college-bound student to take the SAT during the spring of their junior year in the event that a college they apply to requires a score and/or so that a strong score can be used to strengthen the application even if not required by the college.

If you are interested in having your junior take the SAT at school, please call or email Mrs. Slesinsky with your child's name so a test book can be ordered. The cost for the test is \$60, although students who meet the criteria set by the College Board may be given a fee waiver. Checks should be made payable to "Harpursville Central School" and dropped off or mailed to the Guidance Office.



STEM competition

Each year, BT BOCES organizes an Engineering Day that brings together several school districts for a fun and educational day of STEM competition. Teams of students compete to create the best functional Rube Goldberg machine. Students may only work with the supplied set of materials for the project, and they have approximately three hours to complete the machine. Students are not aware of the materials until the day of the competition and are then judged upon several areas of success. This project allows students to work hands-on in a group atmosphere. It helps to utilize not only their educational skills like science and

math, but also interpersonal skills like time management and teamwork. This event truly aides in making school an enjoyable atmosphere for students and encourages friendly competition. Winning groups receive medals, as well the bragging rights amongst all the competing schools.

Harpursville had over 50 students compete in the three days of competition (elementary, middle, and high school level). At the middle school level, Harpursville had teams receive a 2nd and 9th place finishing out of almost 60 teams! Congratulations to all involved!



STEM advisor, Mrs. Harrington with the help of Harpursville Jr. Sr. High science teachers, created a Halloween STEM Scavenger Hunt Challenge for STEM club members in the Jr Sr High School. 26 students participated in launching candy with catapults, building Halloween lava lamps, candy corn challenge, haunted house cup challenge, building pumpkin platforms, and more. They celebrated at the end with cider donuts, apples, cookies and cider.





Robo sensei

In March, the STEM club will be experimenting with and competing against each other using a new App called RoboSensei. This App is an easy-to-use Coding and Robotics Teaching App, designed to teach coding and robot programming in a fun and engaging way. With engaging robot missions, students will be learning how to program their own simulated robots. The students will begin at the entry level and does not require any prior coding or robotics experience. This makes it ideal for students who are just starting to explore the world of technology. RoboSensei also has levels for intermediate and advanced learners. Once our students are proficient at it, we



will be running monthly competitions with the help of Mr. Muller!

The Harpursville STEM club will be traveling to the Electric City Aquarium & Reptile Den in Scranton, PA on Saturday, April 22. The trip will be fully paid for through fundraising efforts by its members and a grant from Visions Federal Credit Union. This should be a fun and educational day for all of our students!



Recorder karate

Beginning in 4th grade, every student in Mrs. Cole's music class is taught the recorder. This instrument is a great tool in teaching the lines and spaces, recognizing rhythms, correct embouchure (the way a player applies their mouth to an instrument), and memorizing correct fingerings. Students practice all these things over several music classes and are eventually given the chance to test for a "belt." Each recorder belt is a small colored rubber band that can be displayed on the bottom of their recorder. To earn the belt, students play a song (that gradually get more difficult in rhythm and notes) for Mrs. Cole. If they are successful, students were able to add their name to the Karate Wall of Fame (outside the cafeteria), proudly display their belt, and move on to the next song. 


