Hornets take 2019 baseball championship - fourth in district history



The Hornets entered the MAC playoffs as the fourth seed. Since 2011, the top four teams in the league make the playoffs. The Hornets became the first team to ever win from the fourth spot. In order to achieve the championship, the Hornets first had to defeat number

one seed and reigning state champion Deposit/ Hancock (15-1). They were able to leave the Eagles absolutely stunned as the Hornets won 12-4 thanks to fantastic pitching from Matt Lyon, who pitched six and a third innings, striking out seven, and

James Grausgruber was absolutely lights out on the mound and earned the win for the

championship overall. The Hornets, coached by Joe Shattan, won the **Susquenanago League Championship in 1955**, which was the first championship in the school's history. The next championship came in **1962**, **when**




the Hornets won the Pioneer League Championship under coach Stub Smith. The next championship

On the way home, we all enjoyed lunch out at Moe's and Wendy's on Front Street.




