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





#### Learning with guided math groups and stations

by Karen Shannon's class

Our fourth-grade students learn their math concepts in a unique manner while also practicing for upcoming state tests.

We start with a whole-group mini-lesson that introduces the target. Teachers model problems for the lesson then students practice some problems, learn vocabulary and discuss their problems with their groups. They then move into smaller groups with their teachers (Karen Shannon and Quinn Berkeley), where they practice the concepts of the target lesson. When the students leave the small group, they are assigned problems to practice independently before they go to the stations.

While some students are meeting in small groups, the others are working at math stations. We've had some fun station activities such as practicing our facts with "wrap ups," in which students use a string to cross over to the product of their

multiplication fact. Another station is called the "creation station," where students design creations using geometric polygon pattern blocks such as triangles, hexagons, rhombus, parallelograms, trapezoids and squares. The students are asked to record how many of each polygon they used for their creation and do some fraction work.

Mrs. Avery, our classroom aide, monitors the independent stations to make sure students are on task and to help them when needed. The station activities are different each week. In another example, students created symmetrical designs at the creation station while playing a fraction festival game. Sometimes the independent stations are for review, and some relate to the fraction lessons they are currently learning.


