Recognizing the fluctuations in state funding, our board is proactively planning for the future, ensuring sustained support for our educational objectives. During the board of education meeting on April 22, the budget for the next school year was approved at \$23,539,855. As always, our district has diligently managed expenses, staying within the allowable tax levy limit of 3.04%. While most budgetary adjustments are routine, we welcome any questions you may have and encourage you to explore additional budget information on our website. For those opting for an absentee ballot, qualified voters may request one from District Clerk Tabaitha Rhodes.

As we approach the culmination of another school year, we're filled with excitement for the future. Your continued support means the world to us, and we thank you for considering the proposed 2024-2025 budget. I wish you and your family a fantastic end to the school year!



Capital outlay projects enable districts to improve with state aid support

The district continues to strive to ensure safe and sound facilities that enhance learning for our students. By completing yearly capital outlay projects, the district can get capital construction work completed and receive the state aid back on the project the following year. As a reminder, the district receives approximately 93% of the costs via New York State Building Aid. This year, the district plans to continue updating external doors in the W.A. Olmsted Elementary School.



A trip to the aquarium

Students in Deidra Bigelow's Real World Science class were able to visit the Via Aquarium in Schenectady, NY on Monday, March 25. Students were able to participate in touch tanks where they got the opportunity to touch sting rays and feed koi fish. They were also able to attend a session on ocean invertebrates where they learned about horseshoe crabs, pencil sea urchins, moon jellyfish, and chocolate chip sea stars, all of which they were able to touch. Students had a great time and learned a lot of information about the organisms!



Hornet's Hope: Harpurville's Newest Food Resource Center

Harpurville Jr./Sr. High School is now offering free supplemental groceries to students and their families. Last month, our partners at Binghamton University Community Schools (located in room 102 in the Jr./Sr. High School) began teaming up with Good Neighbors, a local nonprofit organization that aims to connect and strengthen communities through the sharing of surplus food from local grocery stores and restaurants. Through these partnerships, our school is helping to feed families and fight food insecurity in our community.

Over spring break, 25 families participated in the program, with students bringing home some extra groceries for free.

Every week, students and their families can stock up on a variety of items such as pasta, bread, canned vegetables and fruits, soups, cereals, snacks, condiments, and so much more. The Food Resource Center is restocked with fresh items each week and managed by our BU social work interns.

The Food Resource Center is open to the entire school community, and families are encouraged to use it as needed.
