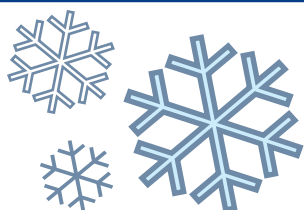

## Regional conference stresses hard work, strong leadership

## Superintendent's message - A successful new year awaits

Dear residents,

I hope you've had a wonderful holiday season. Here at Harpursville Central Schools, we had a great time with our classroom and school-wide celebrations, as well as with our holiday chorus and band concerts. Thank you to all who came out to support our musicians.

As fun as this time of the year can be, I am happy to leave the month of December behind, not so much for its busyness, but because of the winter-like weather that we were "enjoying" throughout much of it. Looking ahead, I'm sure there is plenty more weather where that came from.

With that seasonal change comes our transition to a new calendar year. I believe that we are poised to have a truly outstanding New Year. My best wishes to you for a happy, healthy and productive 2017. I'd like to take a moment to highlight a couple of important things that will be happening in the next couple of months.

First, we have a vote for two new buses and a suburban scheduled for February 7. As always, we have tried to provide our residents with as much information as possible about this proposal. During our regularly scheduled Board of Education meeting on January 9, we conducted a public information session that touched on the planned replacement schedule for the buses as well as the financial plan for fleet replacement. Updating our fleet is not only important from a safety standpoint, but it also makes good financial sense when one considers trade-in values and our

state transportation aid. As you likely know, it is critically important that we maintain our fleet and that we establish a sound, continuous replacement schedule. With that in mind, please be sure to contact the district office if you have any questions related to the bus vote. Furthermore, I would ask that you mark your calendar to come out to vote on February 7.

Another important topic as we begin the New Year is the start of the budget planning process for the 2017-2018 school year. We are eager to see the

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state's executive proposal for school funding, which should be released early in 2017. This will help us shape our budget, although it is a process that will surely evolve over the late winter and early spring. The budget development calendar is available for your review on the district website. We will use the "Budget and Tax Information" page on the "District" drop-down tab to post budget-related information. The initial budget presentation will be at our regularly scheduled board meeting on February 13. Although there is still

some work to do on our budget as a continuation of last year's challenges, I am optimistic about the process and its resulting budget. Rest assured, we will continue to provide an outstanding educational experience for our students that includes a rich and diverse curriculum accompanied by sound extracurricular opportunities.

I continue to be impressed and amazed by the outstanding work of our students and staff. I also sincerely appreciate the support we receive from so many of our families. I think it's worth repeating a statement I made last month: The positivity and support that so many people extend to our schools and our programs helps students and staff feel good about our work and motivates everyone to be our best and to keep working hard. 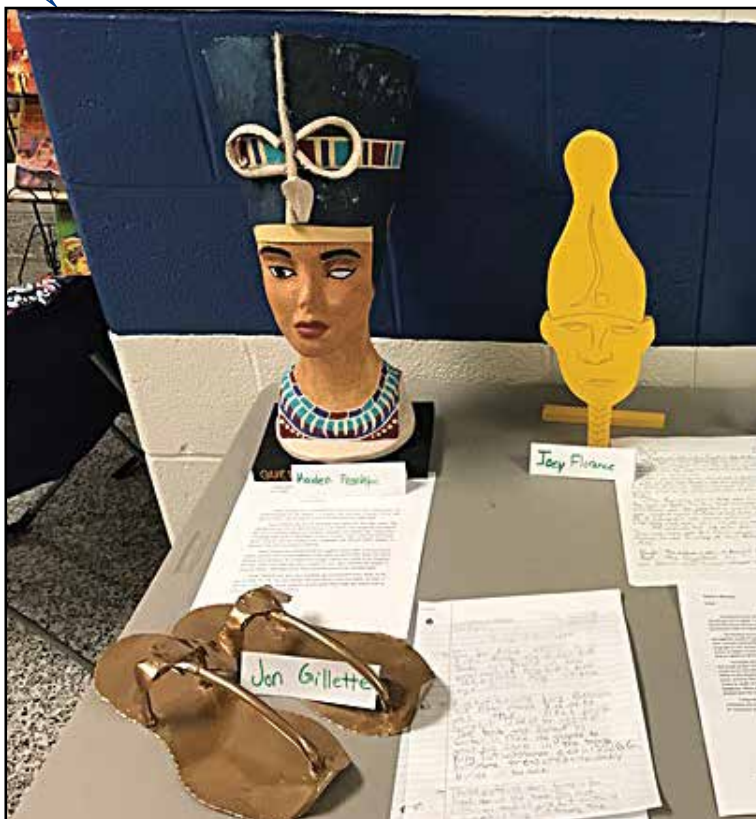

In December, sixth-grade social studies teacher Denise Talbut hosted the 11th Annual Ancient People Project Museum Night.

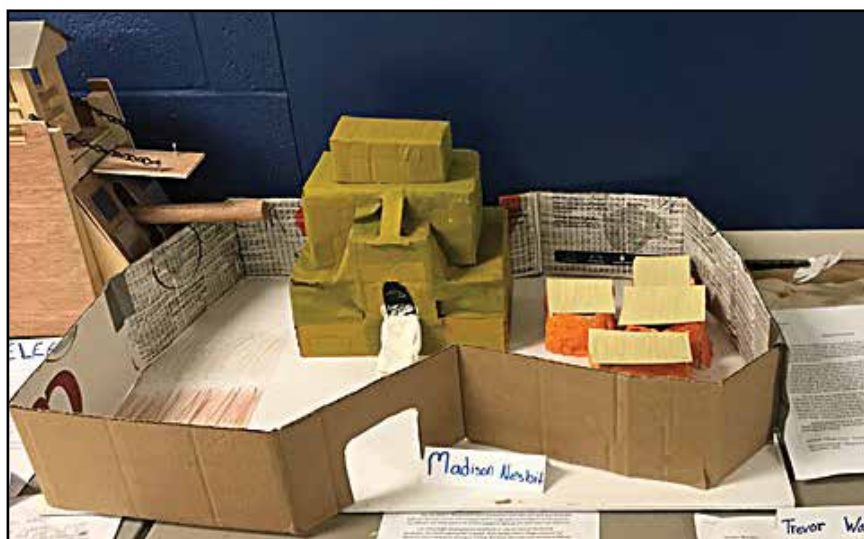
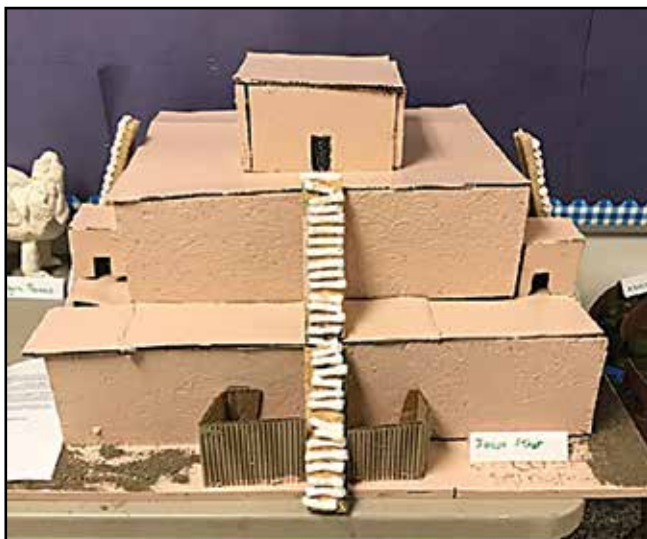
Students chose from a list of topics - from Ancient Mesopotamia and Ancient Egypt - that they had encountered in social studies lessons over the past

five weeks.

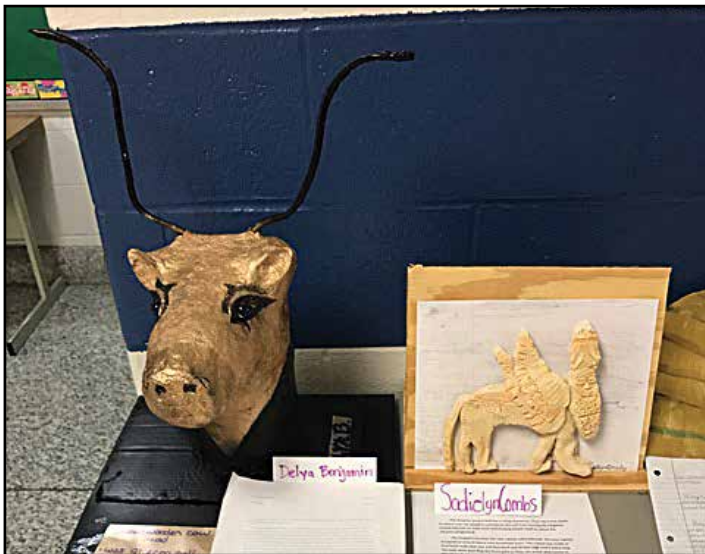
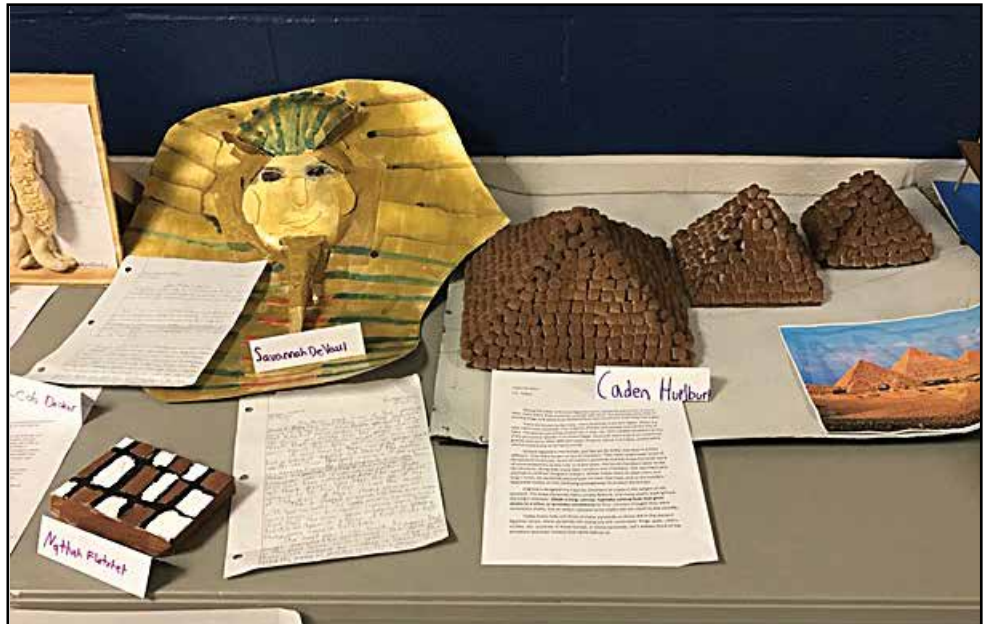
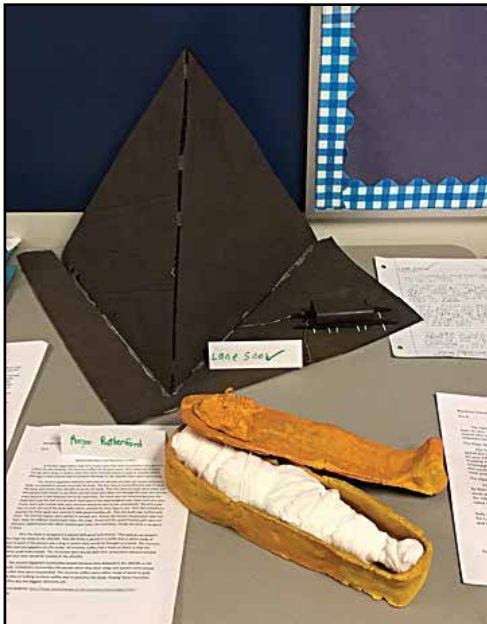
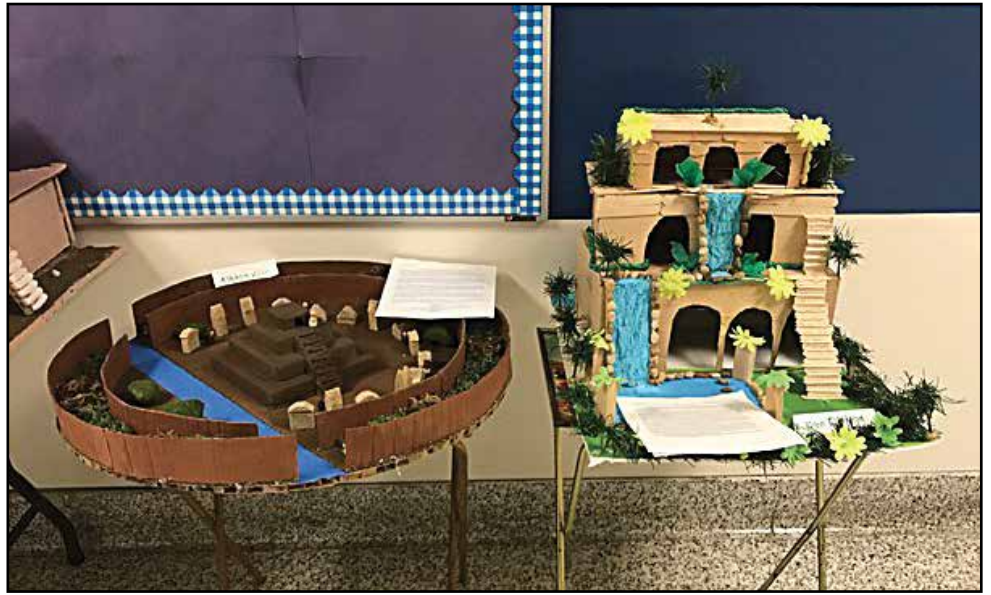
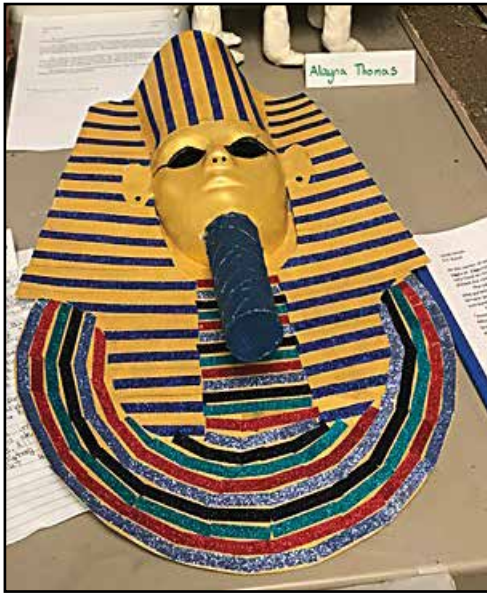
