Dear residents,

I hope this newsletter finds you safe and healthy. The last couple of years have really thrown us some curve balls, from a pandemic to a significant, multi-day power outage. Through it all, we continue to persevere. Moreover, we continue to provide the opportunities and experiences our students deserve so that they can grow and thrive. It is with our students in mind that we provide our plan for the district's proposed budget for the 2022-2023 school year, one that continues to ensure our students are afforded the resources needed to learn and excel.

In the last newsletter, I pridefully highlighted so many successes of our students while also reminding residents of the variety of activities and opportunities our students have access to through our diverse educational and co-curricular programming. This is only made possible through our Board of Education's leadership, the dedicated work of our faculty and staff, and the continuous support provided by our entire school community. Thank you!

Over the past few months, we have been planning for the next school year and working to develop a budget that supports the district's goals. To that end, at its meeting on April 18, the Board of Education approved a budget of \$21,878,679 for the next school year. This is an increase of 0.4% from the current budget, an increase of less than onehalf of one percent. As you know, the Board of Education and the administration have worked diligently the past many years to control the growth of our expenses within the district and this year was no different. It is also worth noting that the district is staying within the allowable tax levy limit of 2.42%, equating to \$108,291. Additionally, consistent with the past several years, we are not planning to use any of our restricted reserves as a means of balancing the budget for next year. This is excellent financial news for the district both now and for the future.

As you review the budget information, you will notice that most of the other items are rather standard year-to-year adjustments that occur. However, if there is something that you are wondering about, don't hesitate to reach out to us for the information. There is additional budget information on our website, so please feel free to peruse those documents. All budget presentations and related

documents from the budget development process are provided - under the "District" drop-down, you will see a link to "Budget & Tax Information." Furthermore, please feel free to call me or school Business Administrator Joseph McLaughlin at 607-693-8120 with any questions.

Please mark your calendar for the annual vote on Tuesday, May 17, 2022, from 1:30 - 8 p.m. in the elementary gymnasium. In addition Superintendent to the budget vote, we have also

HCS mathletes shine at statewide competition

The Harpursville Mathletes season was capped off by participating in the New York State Mathematics League (NYSML) statewide competition on April 2. Students from all over New York state meet regionally and compete virtually in the annual spring competition. Harpursville is a member of the Southern Tier Mathletes who fielded a team from its participating schools. Seniors Sarah Young and Ben Williams joined 18 other students from around our region at Vestal High School for the Saturday morning competition.

The competition began with the team round. Sarah and Ben were placed on teams with students from Vestal, Seton, Johnson City, Union-Endicott and Maine-Endwell. The teams, who had never met, came together quickly and worked together to answer 10 questions in 20 minutes. Next, was the "Mega Question" round, during which the students have to teach themselves a new concept and then immediately apply the new skill to answer 10 questions. This year's topic was "Taxi Cab Geometry."

For example, in the plane, the taxicab distance between (p_1, p_2) and (q_1, q_2) is $|p_1 - q_1| + |p_2 - q_2|$.

Next, 10 individual questions were followed by two rounds of the "Relay" round, in whijch students are not allowed to talk but instead pass the answer to their question on a slip of paper. Student 1 completes the problem and passes the answer to student 2. Student 2 must then use that number in the set-up of their problem. The student then sets up and completes the problem, passing their answer to student 3. Student 3 then uses that number and completes their problem, completing the relay. The relay is timed at six minutes with bonus points given if the problems are answered correctly before the 3-minute mark. (See example above) Sarah's team on Relay #1 not only answered correctly but did so under the 3-minute mark to earn the bonus points for the team.



The results were then sent in by the coaches to NYSML and on Sunday they announced the rankings. Our Southern Tier Mathletes ranked 16 out of the 27 teams.

One can learn a lot from launching jellybeans across the room...really!

Students taking Regents Algebra 1 were "treated" to an optional project during homeroom time. Teacher Jayme Manville set up catapults to launch jellybeans. The students worked in teams of three to launch, time and measure the path of the jellybean. They then used their newly acquired quadratic skills of solving and graphing to calculate the path that the jellybean took from the catapult to the floor. In doing so, they needed to calculate the vertex of the parabolic flight, write the function in vertex form and calculate the coefficient of quadratic term. Once completed, we changed the location of the catapult from the floor to a desk. Moving the catapult up to a desk changed the launch point of the jellybean so the students had to rewrite their functions compensating for the new y-intercept. They then solved their quadratic function to predict where the jellybean will land when launched from a desk. Students attempted to hit their target three times. Melissa Cantone-Gnyp was able to



hit her target two out of three times. The only thing left to do was to enjoy some jellybeans ... those that were not on the floor.

Capital outlay projects enable districts to improve with state aid support

The district continues to strive to ensure safe and sound facilities that enhance learning for our students. By completing yearly capital outlay projects, the district can get capital construction work completed and receive the state aid back on the project the following year. As a reminder, the district receives approximately 93% of the costs via New York State Building Aid. This year, the district plans to update the flooring on the first floor of the Jr/Sr High School. This will run from outside the Family and Consumer Science room all the way to the terrazzo floor outside of the music wing (excluding the new flooring from the latest capital project).

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2022 board member election
