Superintendent to community: Good attendance is critically important

Dear parent/guardian,

We've been back to school for just a few weeks now and I can tell you that everyone in our schools is thrilled to see the students back in our classrooms. It has been an outstanding start to the school year and we all look forward to the opportunity to work with the students. In order to maximize that effort, it is our goal this year to ensure that every student attends school regularly.

Showing up for school has a huge impact on a student's academic success starting in kindergarten and continuing through high school. Even as children grow older and more independent, families play a key role in making sure students get to school safely every day and understand why attendance is so important for success in school and in life.

We realize some absences are unavoidable due to health problems or other circumstances, but we also know that when students miss too much school- regardless of the reason - it can cause them to fall behind academically. Your child is less likely to succeed if he or she is chronically absent-which means missing 18 or more days over the course of an entire school year. Research shows:

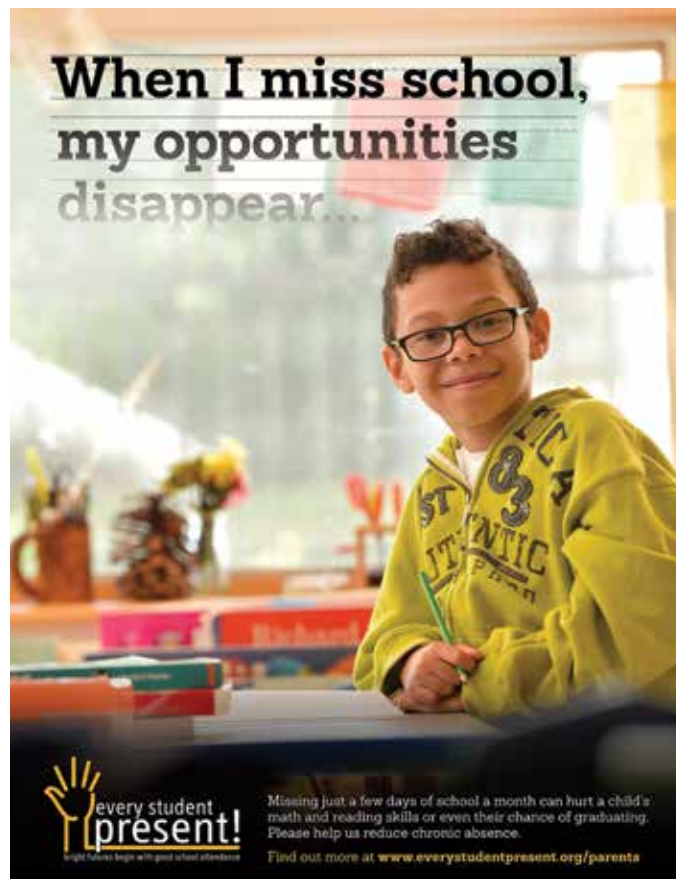
- Children chronically absent in kindergarten and 1st grade are much less likely to read at grade level by the end of 3rd grade.
- By 6th grade, chronic absence is a proven early warning sign for students at risk for dropping out of school.
- By 9th grade good attendance can predict graduation rates even better than 8th grade test scores.

Absences can add up quickly. A child is chronically absent if he or she misses just two days every month.

Clearly, going to school regularly matters!

We don't want your child to fall behind in school and get discouraged. Please ensure that your child attends school every day and arrives on time. Here are a few practical tips to help support regular attendance:

- Make sure your children keep a regular bedtime and establish a morning routine.
- Lay out clothes and pack backpacks the night before.
- Ensure your children go to school every day unless they are truly sick.



- Avoid scheduling vacations or doctor's appointments when school is in session.
- Talk to teachers and counselors for advice if your children feel anxious about going to school.
- Develop backup plans for getting to school if something comes up. Call on a family member, neighbor, or another parent to take your child to school.

Let us know how we can best support you and your children so that they can show up for school on time every day.

Child Find is the process of locating, evaluating, and identifying students, birth to 21 years of age, with disabilities who are in need of special education services.

According to federal special education law, IDEA 2004, this applies to all students, including those who are homeless, wards of the state, or attending private schools, regardless of the severity of their disabilities.

If you have a child between the ages of 5-21 with a suspected disability, please contact your child's teacher at Harpursville Central School. The district is now required to try a range of academic or behavioral interventions when a student has a suspected disability. If the student is not responding to the interventions after an appropriate period of time, the student's teacher will refer the student

to the grade-level team or the RTI team and additional interventions will be suggested and documented. It is at that time that a student may be referred to the committee on special education.

When a student is referred to the committee on special education for a suspected disability, they are given an individual evaluation to identify the need for special education services. A student is eligible for special education services if it is determined that he/she has a disability that is interfering with their learning. If the committee on special education determines that a child is eligible for special education services, the committee must identify the one disability category that most appropriately describes that child.

The committee on special education will develop and implement an individualized education program (IEP) to address the child's individual needs. Services, such as integrated co-teaching, consultant teacher, or

resource room, may be provided. Related services, such as speech/language therapy, occupational therapy, physical therapy, or counseling may also be provided. A child may need classroom or testing accommodations to help him or her successfully access the general education curriculum.

If you have a child with a suspected disability, age birth to 3 years of age, we encourage you to contact the early intervention program at the Chenango County Health Department or Broome County Health Department. For children ages 3 to 5 years of age, you may contact the committee on preschool special education at Harpursville Central School (693-8104) or the Chenango or Broome County health departments.

Health assessment underway

It is natural to measure your child's height and weight, or to assess their hearing, vision or other health concerns. Emotional health issues can affect how children perform in school, how they relate to family members, and their ability to make friends. Family Enrichment Network and Broome County Mental Health, in cooperation with your school district, are pleased to make a free, voluntary, and confidential questionnaire available to help you assess your child's emotional health.

The "strengths and difficulties" questionnaire will be distributed to parents of students in grades K-8 who attend schools in Broome County. Parents/guardians should take a moment to review the packet, complete the permission form and questionnaire, and return the survey to school or via postal mail in the envelope provided. The Clinic Plus coordinator will score the assessments and return results only to the parent/guardian, unless they have provided consent to share the results with school staff.
